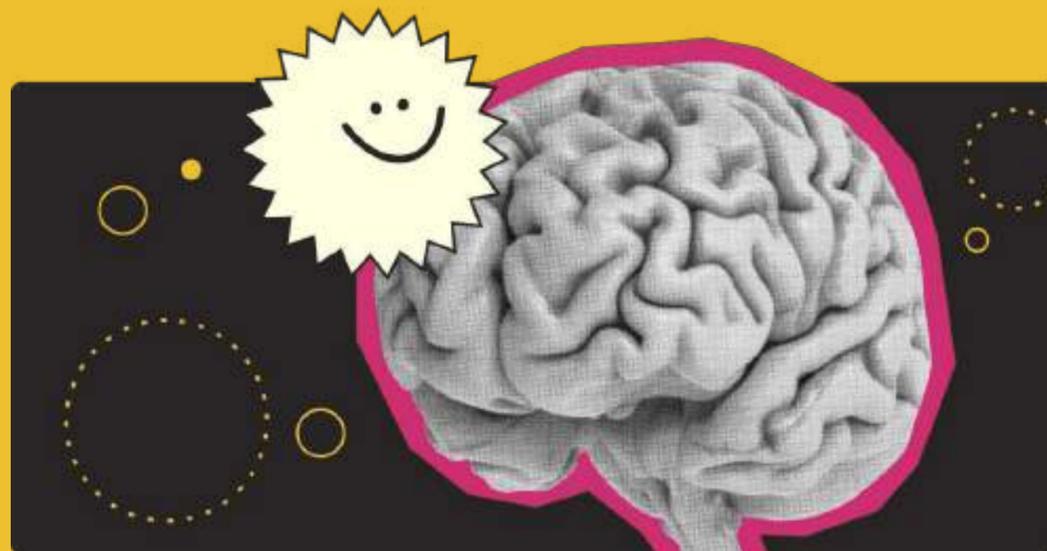

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Together for Good

According to a National Population Health Survey by MOH, 18-29 year olds had the highest prevalence of poor mental health as compared to other age groups! There are many reasons for this. Transitioning from school to work can be an especially confusing time moving from a controlled environment of sorts to having to navigate adulthood. This has real life implications on individuals, communities, and the economy in Singapore and beyond. This period of time with a lot of uncertainties is also when individuals may be looking for additional support and have the autonomy to do so. As individuals sit in various spaces, TFG is looking to put into practice its 3E mission of **ENGAGING** organisations, **EMPOWERING** individuals, and **ELEVATING** lives and communities.



Matter.Less

The inertia to start conversations about mental health arises due to social stigma. (a) In the Malay-Muslim community, death and suicide remains a taboo topic, the grieving process of an individual who lost someone to suicide is often isolating, with difficulties reaching out to family members who go through the same thing. (b) The sex worker community are vulnerable to mental health issues due to their occupational hazards (assault, rape, scam), and society's lack of understanding that sex work is work. This group is often invisible and driven underground, reaching out for help (professional or to those around them) in the aftermath of traumatic events experienced during work is a challenge for them. How do we destigmatize these communities and issues, and start more conversations on



Check-In Champions

As Singapore move from sick care to proactive and preventive healthcare, how could we do the same for mental health? With physical health, we could have a healthy diet, exercise frequently and go for regular check-ups, but what can we do for our mental health, especially with the stigma surrounding us?



ASHTRONAUT

In our stoic Asian culture, it is difficult to talk about death. How can we encourage discussions on mental well-being topics, such as loss, grief & dealing with suicidal thoughts, and increase our death literacy through these conversations? Death Literacy is the willingness to take action, coupled with the practical knowledge needed to plan well for end of life. One is never too young to start thinking about these matters.



Hauora

Mental health resources are being shared in schools. However, it is difficult for teachers to find engaging ways to encourage their students to change long-term behaviours. How can we make such sessions more engaging for and relatable to students?



KURA KURA

Loneliness is the feeling of being disconnected from others, when there is a gap between the social connections we desire and those we receive. Generation Zs surveyed are significantly more likely than any other generation to experience the feelings associated with loneliness. In fact, almost 30% of Gen Zs we surveyed in Singapore feel that they have no one to talk to about their struggles. This is despite them being active users of social media. How can we make it easier to receive the right doses of meaningful social connection?

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Project Integration

In this 21st-century landscape, suicide is now the second leading cause of death among 15-29-year-olds. Stemming from the lack of vulnerability, self-awareness (Flynn & Rudolph, 2007), identity crisis (Marcia, 2002), anti-social and high impulsivity (Glatz et al, 2011), youths are susceptible to mental issues (Patterson, 2020) if their mental wellbeing is overlooked. How can we prevent such instances from happening?



Team Hosehbo

How might we encourage discussions on mental well-being topics in order to encourage youths in overcoming their concerns so that they can normalized mental well-being.



Lovespan

Communication issues account for 65% of divorces, followed by a failure to resolve conflicts which accounts for 43%. It is important for couples to diffuse conflicts, find solutions, and meet both parties' needs, while staying respectful. Considering Singapore's high divorce rate, how do we help couples communicate better and manage conflicts?

Youths between 18 to 25, are at the phase of rapid mental maturity, that includes the refinement of their thought processes and the formation of deeper connections. During which, it is often unfamiliar and challenging to manage relationships. How do we create values and reasons for youths to meetup more and connect deeply with their peers

Despite increasing mental health awareness, there are still numerous bullying and other unreported incidents that remain unaddressed and lead to trauma and isolation. How might we provide a safe space for youths so that those struggling with their mental health have access to an immediate community they can turn to?



The Social Laboratory

One in three youth in Singapore suffer from symptoms of depression, anxiety, and other mental health issues. This growing crisis is taking a devastating toll on our youth, hindering their ability to reach their full potential and thrive in life. We believe that the key to addressing this issue lies in creating a positive youth development program that builds confidence, resilience, and peer support within the youth community.

Divert for 2nd Life (D2L.sg)

50% of Singapore's food waste comes from businesses and a significant amount is still edible. Some businesses may divert the food from bins, but the most common methods are putting food in the digester or composting them. Imagine blemished but still nutritious berries thrown into the digester when they could have been eaten by a grateful human being - what a waste! At the same time, a large and growing number of people in Singapore, including youths, is suffering due to rising costs of living and worsening food security. How can **all** surplus food go to the **best and highest** use, benefitting humans, then animals, then plants, using the least amount of resources while generating maximum environmental and social good?



Terraformers

Singaporeans are aware of environmental issues but struggle to participate meaningfully in sustainable initiatives. In fact, 75% of Singaporeans want a better way to get involved. How can we establish deep connections between lifestyles and climate to cultivate a strong regenerative culture? Through Regenerative Travel, you can experience authentic daily lifestyles of indigenous peoples and nomads in climate-vulnerable geographies, encouraging the preservation of cultures that face the threat of elimination by climate change.

Every year, Singapore food manufacturers dispose perfectly safe-to-eat food due to excess stock. While there are plenty of businesses are upcycling food for humans, currently there are little upcycled options for pets in Singapore. How might we upcycle excess food into nutritious and functional food for pets in Singapore?



EzGreen

Singaporeans (about 80%) are becoming more environmentally conscious, but unsustainable practices are still prevalent in Singapore, For example, about 800 thousands tonnes of food wasted; Only 19% of food and 6% of plastic waste were recycled, etc. So, how can we bridge the gap between thinking and actions, and to encourage more Singaporeans to take part actively in sustainable practices?



Cofeco

Singapore aims to cut waste to landfills by 30%, and there is roughly 6000 tonnes of coffee grounds waste annually. How can we reduce our coffee grounds waste?

According to the OCBC Climate Index, the top three reasons Singaporeans do not adopt green practices include inconvenience and finding it hard to maintain sustainable habits. How might we incentivize Singaporeans to reduce their waste and increase their awareness on methods of doing so?

Households are reluctant to change their lifestyle choices and behaviour despite knowing adopting a green lifestyle is "good" and "right". How might we integrate the paradox of people knowing adopting green habits is right, and them actually practicing green habits at home?

A large part of the reason why Singaporeans face such difficulty in adopting green lifestyles is due to the inconvenience and the green premium faced by individuals when they attempt to do so. As the public has little say in sustainability policies and initiatives, a growing discrepancy between what consumers want and what is available will continue to form. How can we make it more accessible for everyone?

Food waste is the 3rd most disposed waste that takes up unnecessary space and emits harmful gas when burnt. Current pet food options lack nutrients and are tasteless as well. How can we reduce food waste in Singapore whilst providing pets with healthier, nutritional food?

Climate change affects the cities people inhabit, however, a growing proportion of urban dwellers lack an understanding of climatic concerns in their cities until crisis strikes. This hinders communication between stakeholders during crisis prevention. In Singapore, this needs to be addressed to improve the quality of dialogue on rising sea-levels and better understand public sentiments for better planning. How can you contribute?



EcoNation

In 2020 alone, Singapore contributed 665,000 tons of food wastage! As the amount of food waste is proportional to our carbon footprints, Singaporeans should play their part by inculcating habits to reduce food wastage from young. How can we encourage Youths to reduce food waste?

How can we integrate the importance of sustainable fashion and conscious consumerism in today's education system?

Project Forget-Me-Not

One in ten Singaporeans aged 60 and above has dementia – a situation that will only worsen over time. A lack of understanding towards dementia results in many being unprepared when loved ones are diagnosed, impairing their ability to treat them with dignity. Awareness and advance planning can alleviate the situation. How can we prevent such thing from happening?



Silver Online Service

Amidst rapid advancements in technology, many seniors struggle to keep up and become digital immigrants. Many seniors fail to utilize the full potential of digital solutions for many modern-day lifestyles and feel isolated from society. How can we promote active aging by improving technological literacy among seniors?



Together We Can

Most NPOs lack funding. Just a few charities account for 85% of donations, yet there are more than 600 NPOs just in Singapore. More than half of them have less than 6 months of operating reserves. Hence they focus more on fundraising than on their own mission. How can we make this more sustainable?

Youths may lack the resources or network for upward mobility in education & later life - particularly through means of university education or scholarships, two valued precursors to success in Singapore. How can we better prepare them?



SHANGE (HAYWECARE)

In the context of declining volunteerism, only less than 20% of Singaporeans enjoy volunteering. They find it hard to find volunteering opportunities which match their interests. They will like to see the impact of their contributions but do not feel it. Whereas, social organisations - non-government organisation and ground-up initiatives, still require help in connecting the right volunteers to the right roles. How can we improve volunteerism rates amongst individuals and strengthen the volunteering process within social organisations within our society?
