Traders and Declaring Agents

ADVISORY ON UNDER-DECLARATION OF VALUES FOR IMPORTS OF FURNITURE

Singapore Customs is issuing this advisory to remind traders and declaring agents to ensure accurate and complete declarations for imports of furniture, following recent cases of under-declaration of import values.

2 Through targeted profiling and post-clearance audits, Singapore Customs identified traders who had consistently declared unusually low import values for furniture products. The audits found instances of under-declaration of import values, resulting in approximately \$250,000 in GST short-paid over a three-year period.

3 Traders and declaring agents are reminded that they are responsible for ensuring that declarations submitted in import permits are accurate and complete. The submission of an incorrect declaration is an offence under the Customs Act. A person guilty of making an incorrect declaration under the Customs Act is liable on conviction to a fine of up to \$10,000 or an amount equivalent to the duty and GST payable, whichever is higher, and/or imprisonment for up to 12 months.

4 All traders and declaring agents are strongly encouraged to review their past import transactions to determine whether there has been any GST short-payment. Where incorrect declarations have been made, traders and declaring agents should submit a voluntary disclosure to Singapore Customs.
