The National Council Against Drug Abuse (NCADA) was formed in January 1995 to serve as a citizens' advisory body on national anti-drug strategies and programmes.

OUR ROLE

- Advise the Government on measures and strategies to curb drug abuse;
- Harness community support for anti-drug programmes; and
- Promote preventive drug education programmes to educate the public on the dangers of drug addiction.



OUR OBJECTIVES

- Promote and uphold Singapore's zero tolerance stance against drugs;
- Build and entrench public awareness of the dangers of drugs and drug abuse;
- Conduct international advocacy and anti-drug research; and
- Evaluate and improve the effectiveness of our anti-drug strategies.



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CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

The year 2025 has been one of purposeful action. As the global drug situation grows increasingly complex, Singapore's resolve to remain drug-free has never been more vital – nor more tested.

The United Nations Office on Drug and Crime's World Drug Report 2025 paints a stark picture: 316 million people used drugs in 2023, equivalent to 6% of the global population aged 15 to 64, and a 28% rise over the past decade. Cannabis accounts for the largest share of this burden, with 244 million users worldwide. While the human toll of drug use disorders amounted to nearly 500,000 deaths and 28 million healthy years of life lost in 2021 alone.

Against this backdrop, NCADA has remained focused on three interconnected priorities: strengthening bonds within the Council, advancing advocacy and thought leadership, and deepening insights to guide our work.

In this new term of the Council, we have taken deliberate steps to sharpen NCADA's strategic focus – reaffirming our roles in thought leadership, advocacy, and encouraging upstream prevention, in close partnership with the Central Narcotics Bureau and community stakeholders.

On advocacy and thought leadership, NCADA leaned forward on emerging concerns around vaping and novel substances such as etomidate-laced vapes, which have gained traction among young people. Recognising that misinformation poses as great a risk as the substances themselves, NCADA collaborated with youth partners including National University of Singapore (NUS) and Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth & National Youth Council to engage tertiary students directly – equipping them to navigate these issues and make informed decisions.

To deepen our insights and learn from international experiences, NCADA's study visit to Hong Kong for the 60th anniversary of the Action Committee Against Narcotics (ACAN) offered a valuable window into how other jurisdictions approach youth advocacy and community engagement. These exchanges continue to sharpen our own thinking as we refine NCADA's approaches.

At the community level, the DrugFreeSG Fund has catalysed 8 community-led projects since the start of NCADA's new term in 2025 – reflecting our belief that ground-up ownership is essential to sustaining a drug-free culture.

Looking to 2026, our priorities remain clear: deepen engagement with youths and parents, strengthen partnerships across our ecosystem, and generate sharper research insights to guide evidence-based advocacy. The conversations we spark today lay the groundwork for a more drug-resilient Singapore tomorrow.

To our Council Members and partners – your dedication is the foundation upon which all of this is built. I am grateful for your commitment, and confident that together we will continue to make meaningful progress in our collective fight against drug abuse.

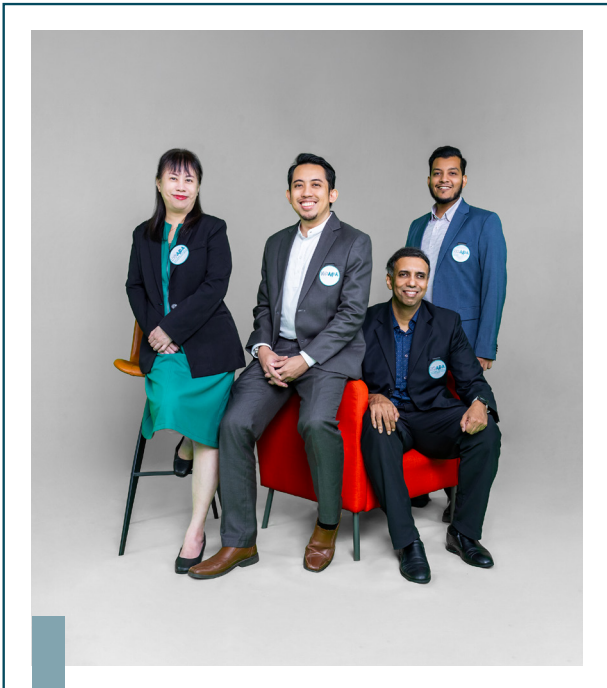

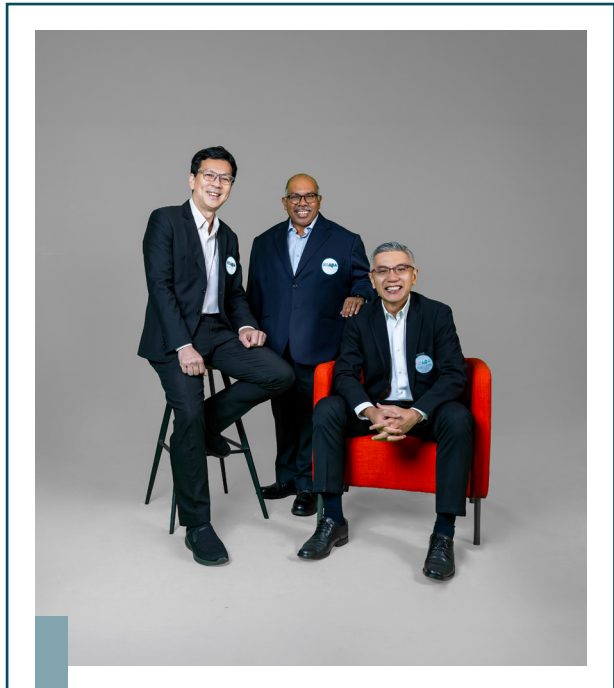

NCADA VICE-CHAIRMAN (VCM) DR CHEW'S OPENING ADDRESS



VCM Dr Chew Tuan Chiong shared his observations of how NCADA had evolved over the years and progress of key activities, such as the National Drug Perception Survey and media campaigns.

NCADA STUDY TRIP TO HONG KONG



The Hong Kong Commissioner for Narcotics, Mr Kesson Lee, invited NCADA to visit Hong Kong in 2025 for the 60th anniversary of Action Committee Against Narcotics (ACAN), Hong Kong's advisory body on anti-drug policies and activities. NCADA participated in one of the milestone events, the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Anti-drug Summit co-hosted by ACAN and the Narcotics Division, Security Bureau of Hong Kong.

The delegation included Mr Tan Chong Huat, Chairman NCADA, NCADA Exco members, and officials from Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA), Central Narcotics Bureau (CNB), and Singapore Prison Service (SPS).



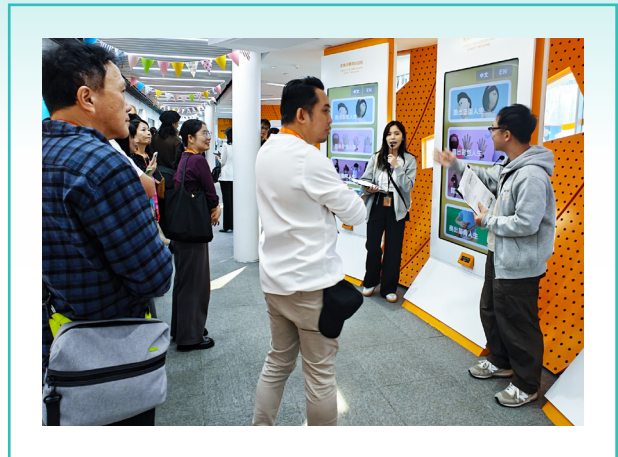

The Anti-Drug Summit brought together 300 participants from 40 government agencies and community organisations from Guangdong, Hong Kong, and Macao to share insights on anti-drug communication efforts, cross-border drug trafficking, and youth engagement. NCADA learnt about how the agencies in the Greater Bay Area emphasised starting anti-drug education from an early age, with a range of targeted strategies such as storybooks for young children, school-based programmes, and the use of relatable characters in media campaigns. Youth advocates from the Greater Bay Area also spoke on their involvement in the community and overseas, demonstrating how young people played an active and important role in the fight against drugs.



Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area Anti-drug Summit

As part of the Summit, the delegation visited Drug InfoCentre, the first permanent information and resource centre on anti-drug education in Hong Kong. The Drug InfoCentre was revamped and re-opened in 2022 and leverages a wide range of formats and modalities to engage audiences such as interactive multimedia displays on the harms of drugs and human-interest stories of ex-abusers and role models. In addition, the exhibition content also shared positive coping strategies to steer youths towards healthier choices.

The delegation took the opportunity to visit Caritas Wong Yiu Nam Centre to observe how non-government organisations overseas conducted anti-drug programmes. The delegation also met the Narcotics Bureau (NB) of the Hong Kong Police Force, which shared about their preventive education and publicity efforts. In particular, NB's Leadership Institute on Narcotics (L.I.O.N.) programme to train students as anti-drug leaders provided inspiration for how NCADA can also mentor and support anti-drug ambassadors.

The study trip allowed for meaningful exchanges of experiences and approaches to drug prevention with foreign counterparts and highlighted the importance of regional partnerships in developing effective drug prevention and community engagement strategies.

IN THE MEDIA



NCADA advocates for the drug-free cause as a strong community voice in the media to share insights on the local drug situation and amplify key messages on prevention.

In 2025, NCADA members had 20 appearances in the media to share perspectives on drug trends, as well as highlight the importance of family conversations and community collaboration. These ranged from radio and television interviews to commentaries, including in our vernacular media which raised awareness in diverse communities. Such media features helped to establish NCADA as a thought leader in the field of drug prevention.

ADDICTED: THE CANNABIS TRAP

This Channel NewsAsia documentary uncovered the myths, dangers, and consequences behind a growing youth addiction crisis. Council members Mr Ravindran Nagalingam and Mr S B Viknesan were interviewed on their advocacy and counselling work, respectively. Mr Ravi was featured engaging a group of youths and discussed with them

how social media and popular culture had influenced their attitudes towards drugs. Mr Viknesan shared about risk factors for addiction and urged those who might be struggling to seek help.



WORLD DRUG DAY COMMENTARY

In conjunction with the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking, or World Drug Day, Chairman NCADA Mr Tan Chong Huat penned a commentary on the importance of conversations in preventing youth drug abuse, which was carried in the four official languages. Drawing on NCADA's National Drug Perception Survey 2023 finding that 91.7% of youth who had spoken with their parents about drugs felt less inclined to try them, Mr Tan called on parents to build these conversations gradually and consistently – emphasising that trusted relationships can be more effective than campaigns or regulations alone.



TV AND RADIO INTERVIEWS

Chairman NCADA Mr Tan Chong Huat, Vice-Chairman Dr Jimmy Lee, and Council members Dr Adrian Loh, Mr Ravindran Nagalingam, Mr S B Viknesan, and Ms Teo Ser Lee served as spokespersons for NCADA on various interviews on TV and radio, sharing key findings from NCADA's perception survey and linking the data to practical advice on engaging youths on drug abuse.

Drug Victims Remembrance Day



Since 2024, Singapore observes Drug Victims Remembrance Day on the third Friday of May each year to remember the lives lost and victims affected by drug abuse – on individuals, families, and society. NCADA was honoured to show our support at the 2025 observance event, which reinforced the importance of staying drug-free and strengthens our collective commitment to a drug-free Singapore.

MEETINGS WITH KEY PARTNERS

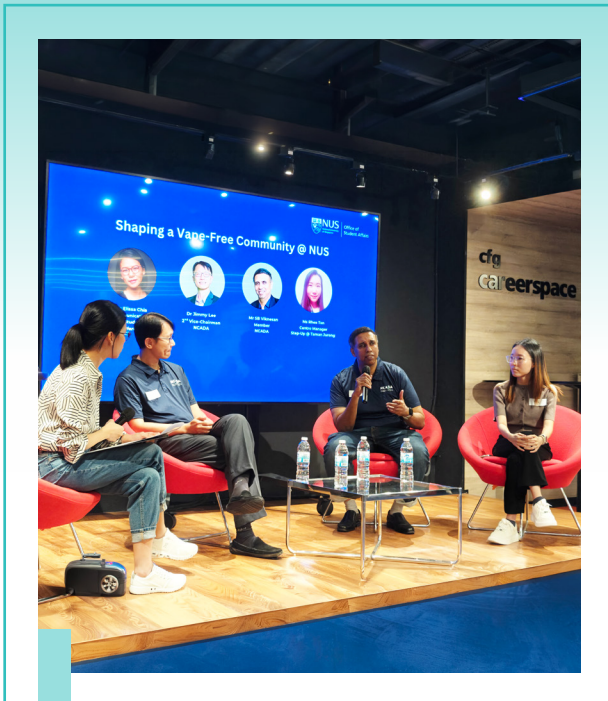
NCADA engages community partners to harness support for preventive drug measures and programmes, and explore potential collaborations on initiatives. In 2025, NCADA met with the Singapore Anti-Narcotics Association (SANA) and learnt more about its Preventive Drug Education (PDE) efforts in schools, as well as possible research partnerships. NCADA also reached out to WE CARE Community Services, another key stakeholder in the anti-drug ecosystem, to discuss working together on education and advocacy efforts. These meetings facilitated follow-up engagements with other agencies like the National Council of Social Services, demonstrating the positive impact of networking and strengthening relationships.

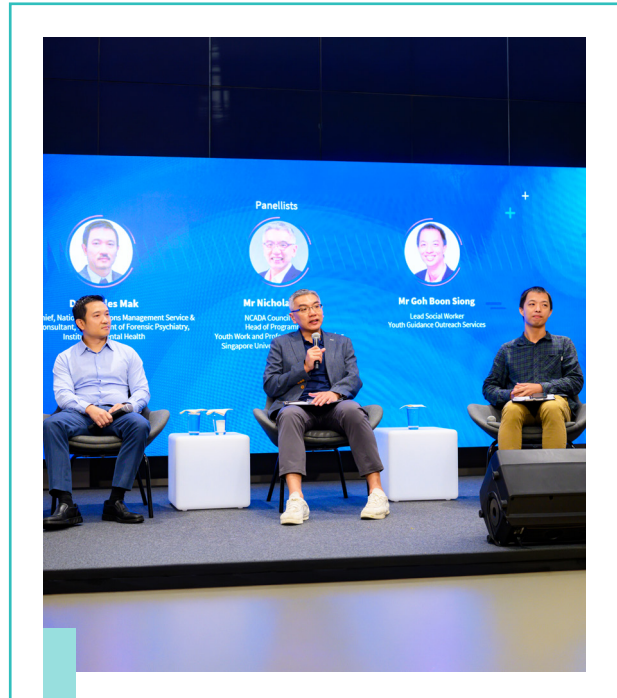

SHAPING A VAPE-FREE COMMUNITY @ NUS

How can university students become effective advocates for a drug-free campus? NCADA Vice-Chairman Dr Jimmy Lee and Council Members Mr S B Viknesan, Dr Tracy Loh, and Mr Ravindran Nagalingam, alongside SANA Centre Manager (Step-Up @Taman Jurong) Ms Rhea Tan, addressed this question at the NUS Student Ambassadors Against Vaping and Drug Abuse Training Session on 18 October 2025. The event, held at Yusof Ishak House and organised by the National University of Singapore's Office of Student Affairs, was attended by 46 student residents and student leaders. The dialogue session focused on equipping student ambassadors with the knowledge and confidence to champion a vape- and drug-free campus culture, covering the harmful health effects of vaping and drug abuse, strategies for peer engagement, and guidance on reporting and support resources. It also engaged students on how they could contribute to the broader DrugFreeSG movement.

“WHAT’S IN THAT PUFF? THE TRUTH ABOUT DRUGS AND KPODS”

On 22 November 2025, NCADA Council Member Mr Nicholas Gabriel Lim joined an expert panel at “What’s In That Puff? The Truth about Drugs and Kpods”, a community engagement session held at The Foundry at Prinsep Link. Organised in partnership with the Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth, the National Youth Council and the Ministry of Health, the session drew over 70 youths, parents, and community stakeholders. Panellists unpacked drug trends and the rising abuse of vapes and etomidate-laced Kpods, shedding light on their health and social costs, warning signs, and available pathways to cessation. Minister of State Rahayu also joined for a fireside chat, and participants rounded off the session with interactive workshops by Architects of Life tailored for both youths and parents.

EMPOWERING COMMUNITY ACTION

THROUGH THE DRUGFREESG FUND



ABOUT THE DFSG FUND



The DrugFreeSG (DFSG) Fund is a grant scheme administered by NCADA on behalf of the Ministry of Home Affairs. Open for applications year-round, the Fund supports community projects that promote preventive drug education and yield anti-drug advocacy outcomes. In 2025, the Fund supported eight local initiatives which engaged youths and families, helping to amplify anti-drug messages among these segments and contributing to a drug-free Singapore.

Projects Supported

NURTURING HABITS OF MIND WHEN USING MEDIA & TECHNOLOGY FOR A DRUG-FREE FAMILY BY VILLAGE CONSULTANCY PTE LTD

Organised by Village Consultancy Pte Ltd, the webinar for families strengthened drug prevention through critical media engagement, covering core media literacy principles and how these can be applied to respond to drug-related narratives online. Reaching more than 50 families, the programme achieved a 25% increase in awareness of the drug issue's contemporary relevance, equipped families with critical thinking skills to navigate online spaces and fostered informed discussions on drug prevention at home.



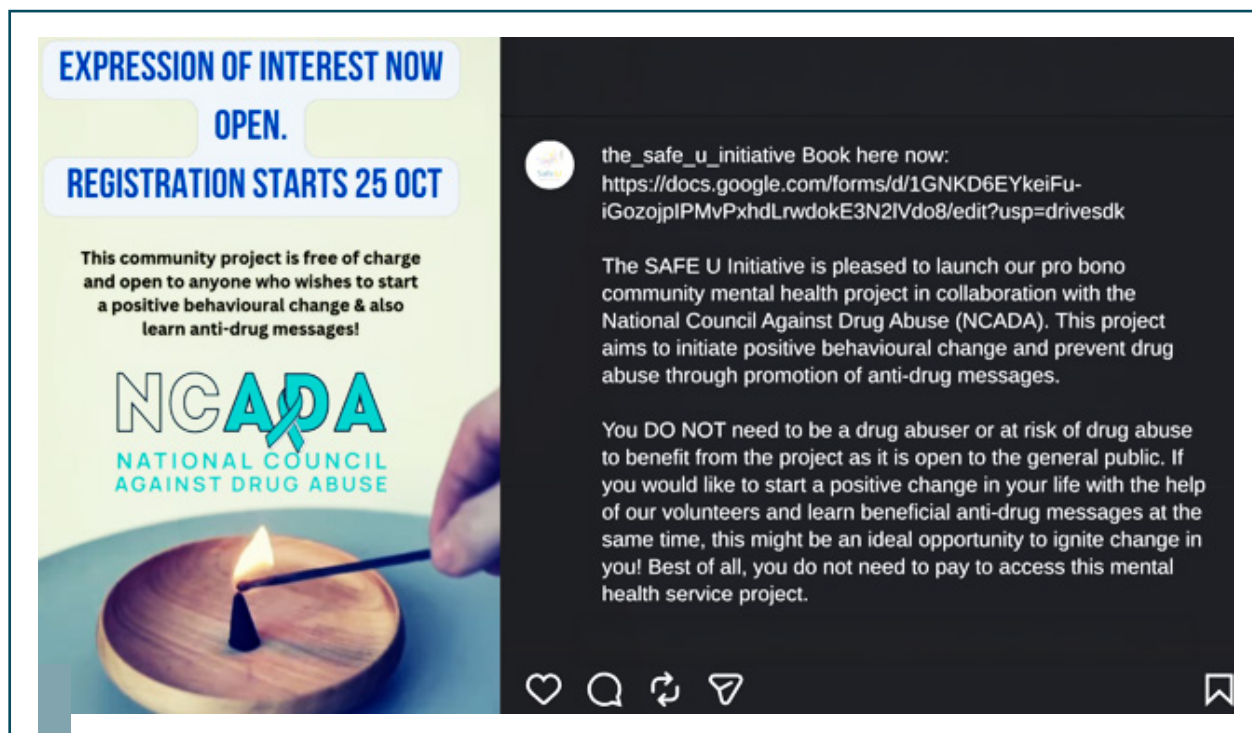
Poster for 'Nurturing Habits of Mind When Using Media & Technology for A Drug-Free Family'

PARENTING TALK & YOUTH PROGRAMME BY FOCUS ON THE FAMILY (FOF) SINGAPORE

The Parenting Talk & Youth Programme by FoF integrated anti-drug education into parenting talks and a youth camp to strengthen family-based drug prevention. The "Raising Resilient Kids" parenting talk series raised awareness among 195 parents about pressures their children faced and equipped them with skillsets to navigate difficult conversations with their children. The "FamChamps Camp" for 85 youths incorporated PDE content across interactive activities, which increased their confidence to discuss peer pressure scenarios, including drug and substance abuse. Overall, participants were empowered to engage in open dialogues on drug abuse and addictions with their families.



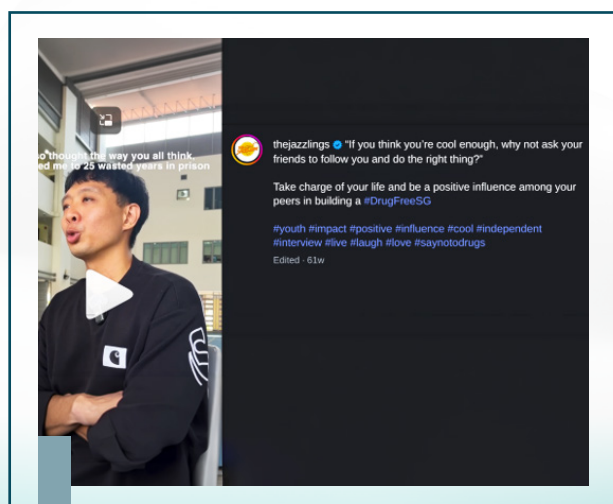

INITIATING BEHAVIOURAL CHANGE TOWARDS PREVENTING DRUG ABUSE BY THE SAFE U INITIATIVE

The Safe U Initiative developed a mental health-focused intervention addressing the underlying reasons behind drug abuse through solution-focused consultations. 13 at-risk individuals participated in the programme, which provided mental health support and facilitated personal action plans to overcome addiction risks and stay drug-free. The project's social media campaign featuring drug-free messaging also achieved an online reach of almost 10,000, amplifying anti-drug messages to the wider public.

STRAITS UP SWINGING BY THE JAZZLINGS

The Jazzlings, a Singaporean youth music collective comprising more than 30 musicians from diverse socio-economic backgrounds, organised 'Straits Up Swinging', a music performance filmed and streamed from a yacht. The project conveyed anti-drug and anti-crime messages to fellow youths and generated unique social media posts advocating for a drug-free generation in Singapore which saw over 18,000 views.

LION DANCE COMPETITION BY NANYANG TECHNOLOGICAL UNIVERSITY, CULTURAL ACTIVITIES CLUB (CAC), DRAGON & LION DANCE

Held on 5 April 2025, the NTU Institutional Lion Dance Competition brought together participants from primary to tertiary level in celebration of traditional Chinese lion dance. Organised annually by NTU's CAC Dragon & Lion Dance, the event incorporated preventive drug education messaging for 400 participants, with broader community outreach reaching 2,520 individuals and a 10-post social media series extending awareness beyond the venue. The initiative reflected how cultural platforms can serve as meaningful touchpoints for drug prevention, engaging youths and the public through shared heritage and community pride.

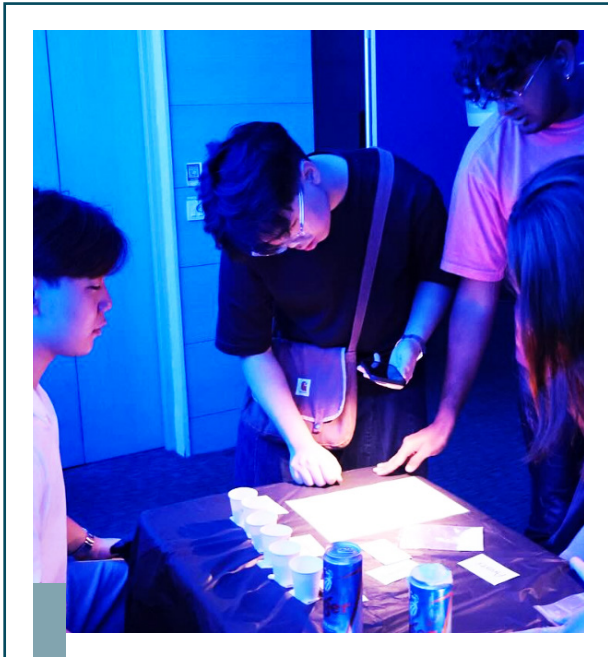

CAMPUS LEGENDS BY SINGAPORE CYBER SPORTS & ONLINE GAMING ASSOCIATION (SCOGA)

Recognising that gaming culture's values of teamwork and strategic thinking have synergies with drug-free living, SCOGA's flagship inter-tertiary esports tournament partnered with NCADA in 2025 under the banner "We Game as One", embedding preventive drug education within a competitive gaming framework.

The initiative reached 696 tournament participants through mandatory educational briefings, with 24 trained ambassadors from five universities extending peer advocacy on their campuses. Six roadshows and a multi-platform social media campaign broadened outreach to 4,700 individuals and 1.1 million cumulative views, respectively.

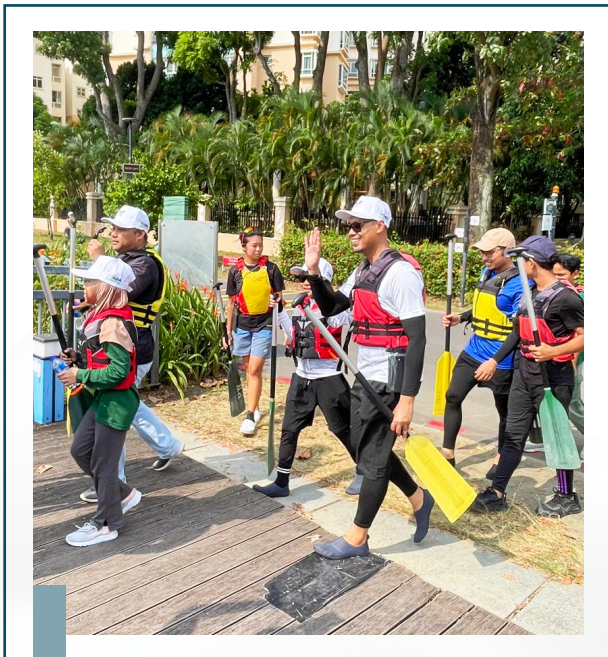
PDE content developed through this project included a character-driven video series on peer intervention, a physical challenge video on the toll of drug use, and conversation cards to spark peer-to-peer discussion on drug prevention.

THE HIDDEN COST BY Ngee ANN POLYTECHNIC

A Final Year Project by Ngee Ann Polytechnic's Diploma in Community Development students, The Hidden Cost used escape rooms and interactive exhibitions to surface the emotional, mental, and social consequences of drug use among youths aged 16 to 24, equipping participants with coping strategies through narrative-driven scenarios involving peer pressure, stress, and family tension. The project engaged 198 students through its experiential sessions, yielding an 84% increase in awareness of drug-related harms, while campus outreach and a 21-post Instagram campaign collectively reached over 1,000 students. By embedding anti-drug advocacy within an engaging, peer-driven format, The Hidden Cost demonstrated how experiential learning can foster critical thinking and a sustained drug-free culture on campus.

PADDLE AGAINST DRUGS BY BAPA SEPANJANG HAYAT, CENTRE FOR FATHERING

Organised by Centre for Fathering's Bapa Sepanjang Hayat movement, Paddle Against Drugs used dragon boating as a vehicle for both father-child bonding and drug prevention advocacy. The shared experience of paddling in unison reinforced family resilience, complemented by an interactive education session conducted by NCADA Council Member Firdaus Daud on the dangers of drug abuse and how fathers can guide their children towards positive choices. The event engaged 84 participants - 35 fathers or guardians and 49 children - with 98% reporting improved understanding of drug abuse and all fathers expressing greater confidence in discussing drug-related issues with their children.

By positioning fathers as mentors and role models, the initiative showed how intergenerational bonding can extend the reach of preventive drug education within families and communities.
