He made history by capturing Singapore's first gold medal in jiu-jitsu at the 2019 Southeast Asian Games in the men's under-62 kg category. He followed up with a second gold at the 2022 SEA Games in the under-69 kg division. At the 2023 Southeast Asian Games he overcame a dislocated pinky to win the men's ne-waza gi under-69 kg gold in just under a minute — marking his third straight SEA Games title in the event. Noah's consistent Games record underscores his composure, resilience and high-level competitiveness across multiple weight divisions and under challenging conditions. On 4 November 2025, he added to his impressive resume with a silver medal in the men's under-69kg event at the Jiu-Jitsu International Federation World Championships.
33 rd SEA Games Flag Bearer	Yeo Jia Min, 26 (Badminton)	Team Singapore's badminton standout Yeo Jia Min has achieved significant milestones. In June 2017, she achieved a landmark feat by becoming the first Singaporean to reach world No. 1 in the Badminton World Federation junior rankings. She clinched a women's singles bronze medal at the 2022 Commonwealth Games. At the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, she became the first Singaporean badminton player to advance to the knockout stage since 2012, topping her group with strong wins before narrowly missing out top 8. She further broke through at the professional circuit by claiming the 2025 German Open title as her first BWF World Tour Super 300 victory. Her performance has steadily helped her to achieve a career high world ranking of top 11 this year. With this blend of major Games results and international titles, Jia Min continues to raise her profile both at home and on the world stage.

Born visually impaired, Joan has always embraced sport as a way to challenge herself and connect with others.
