

## ABOUT THE DRAFT MASTER PLAN 2025

1. The DMP2025 translates land use strategies developed with Singaporeans and stakeholders in the Long-Term Plan Review into detailed plans for the next 10 to 15 years. Long-term planning helps us steward our limited land resources through balancing our diverse needs today, with those of the future.
2. To make Singapore a liveable, inclusive and endearing home where current and future generations can fulfill their aspirations, DMP2025 focuses on:
  - a. **Shaping a Happy and Healthy City** with more inclusive homes and support for active lifestyles and ageing-in-place as well as connected and accessible spaces.
  - b. **Enabling Sustainable Growth** with a vibrant economy that creates opportunities for all.
  - c. **Strengthening Urban Resilience** by leveraging creative solutions to optimise land and combat climate change.
  - d. **Stewarding Nature and Heritage** by enhancing our natural capital and shaping a home that we cherish.

### Public engagement journey to shape the DMP2025

3. Since October 2023, URA has been engaging the public on various development plans in the DMP2025, shaped around four themes of (i) Shaping A Happy Healthy City; (ii) Enabling Sustainable Growth; (iii) Strengthening Urban Resilience; and (iv) Stewarding our Nature and Heritage. Almost 220,000 people have participated in what has been Singapore's most extensive urban planning engagement through a variety of platforms:
  - a. Close to 186,000 visited our exhibitions and roadshows;
  - b. More than 26,000 participated in focus group discussions, workshops and other forms of conversations; and
  - c. Close to 7,000 people responded to public surveys

4. Below is a summary of the key DMP2025 engagements that were conducted over the last two years:

#### Shaping a Happy and Healthy City

- **‘My City, My Home’ exhibition**, featuring plans for liveable and inclusive neighbourhoods in more central locations, including Bukit Timah Turf City, Mount Pleasant, Pearl’s Hill, and Marina South.
- **Recreation Master Plan exhibition** series held islandwide, outlining strategies to make Singapore an island of green, blue and fun, create everyday spaces for active lifestyle, and involve the community in shaping recreational spaces.
- **Bukit Timah Turf City exhibition**, showcasing conceptual plans with a mix of public and private housing, sensitively integrated with heritage and nature.
- **‘Well-Being in the City: Innovating Healthy Living’ Urban Lab exhibition**, showcasing how everyday spaces can be designed to encourage active lifestyles, foster social connections and provide restorative experiences.

#### Enabling Sustainable Growth

- **‘Shaping the Future of Work’ exhibition**, featuring plans to enhance our economic gateways, Downtown, and commercial hubs across the island.
- **Former Jurong Bird Park ideas competition**, to reimagine the former Jurong Bird Park and Jurong Hill area as a vibrant workspace that is anchored on its nature assets as well as recreational identity.

#### Strengthening Urban Resilience

- **‘Shaping a Heat Resilient City’ exhibition**, showcasing efforts to build a more climate-resilient city and innovations that potentially create cooler spaces.
- **‘Delivering the Future: Enabling Safe and Efficient Deliveries’ Urban Lab exhibition**, bringing together innovative solutions to improve last-mile deliveries.

- **'Long Island'** conversations with interest groups, stakeholders and the public to shape a collective vision for 'Long Island' that will not only protect Singapore against rising sea levels but also benefit future generations by achieving multiple national objectives.

#### Stewarding Nature and Heritage

- **'From Rail to Trail' Rail Corridor exhibition**, celebrating 14 years of partnership with Singaporeans to transform the Rail Corridor into a green and inclusive community space, and presenting proposals for future community nodes at Queensway, Stagmont Ring and Tanjong Pagar Railway Station.
- **Tanjong Pagar Railway Station ideas competition**, re-imagining the historic railway station as an inclusive and vibrant community node.
- **Queensway node design competition**, inviting multi-disciplinary teams to submit proposals to transform the node into a multi-functional and inviting space for community use.
- **Identity Corridor** engagements with members of the public and local communities to enhance the Historic East, Kallang River and Inner Ring Identity Corridors.

5. In addition, URA held a dialogue earlier this year with 165 youths aged 16 to 35 years old where they shared their thoughts on what makes Singapore a liveable, inclusive and endearing home, centred on the DMP2025 focus areas of housing, workspaces, greenery and heritage.

6. These engagement platforms and conversations have enabled URA planners to better understand Singaporeans and stakeholders' priorities and concerns. URA has reviewed and studied the feedback and ideas received to draw up the DMP2025 to support Singapore's future development and reflect the collective aspirations of Singapore and Singaporeans.
