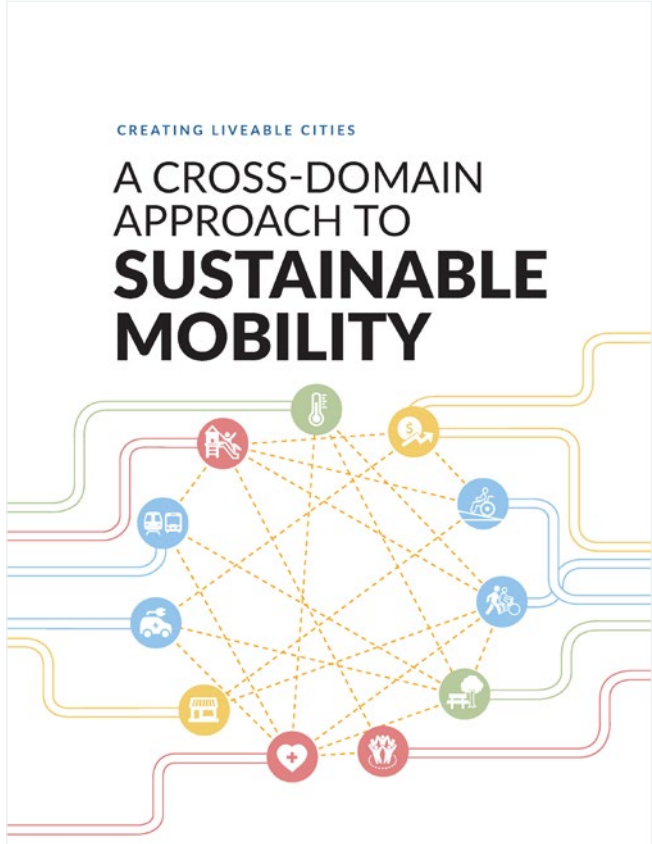


Urban Science Week
