



Levels of Comprehension

Comprehension refers to the ability to listen to or read and understand a text. It involves thinking about and making meaning from print. There are different levels of comprehension (Sadoski, 2004) that children should develop in order to make deeper and fuller sense of a text:

Literal	Understanding what is directly said in the text, e.g., Where did the story take place?, What did the hungry caterpillar eat?
Inferential	Understanding what is implied in the text based on background knowledge along with the words used by the author, e.g., Why is the caterpillar not hungry anymore?
Critical	Evaluating what was read in the text and making judgements about characters, e.g., Is the story real or make believe?, How do you know?
Application	Using the knowledge gained from reading to solve a problem, e.g., <i>If you were to continue the story, what might happen next?</i>
Appreciation	Personalising and becoming part of the story, e.g., Which is your favourite character and why?
