2016 EDITION OF THE SINGAPORE MEDICAL COUNCIL ETHICAL CODE AND ETHICAL GUIDELINES AND HANDBOOK ON MEDICAL ETHICS

- 1. The Singapore Medical Council (SMC) Ethical Code and Ethical Guidelines (ECEG) were last revised in 2002. Since then, medical practice in Singapore has evolved to become more complex, with advanced technology, innovative communication means, new modalities of treatment, a wide range of organisational as well as business models in medicine and changing expectations of the community we serve. To better address and to enable practitioners to navigate the ethical issues encountered in modern medical practice, the SMC has revised and updated the ECEG and the revised ECEG is now referred to as the **2016 edition of the SMC ECEG** (2016 ECEG).
- 2. The 2016 ECEG is accompanied by an educational resource that is called the **SMC Handbook on Medical Ethics** (2016 HME). This Handbook contains additional material that elaborates on the 2016 ECEG, explains its application and provides advice on the best practices. You are encouraged to read the Handbook to know more about medical ethics.
- 3. A Working Committee to review the ECEG was appointed by the SMC in September 2010 comprising Council members and other senior doctors and ethicists with considerable experience in medical ethics (see <u>Annex</u>). The review process included the initial stage of providing suggestions on the areas for revision, the focus group discussions, and the two profession-wide consultation exercises in 2014 and 2015 besides many meetings by the Working Committee and SMC. More details on the review process could be found in the "Explanatory Notes".
- 4. The principles which the SMC and Working Committee applied in reviewing and approving the 2016 ECEG and the corresponding HME are:
 - (a) Relevance to modern medical practice;
 - (b) Adapting to the complexities and variations of medical practice;
 - (c) Protecting patients' best interests while being fair to doctors;
 - (d) Maintaining the values important to society and to the medical profession;
 - (e) Regulating ethical behaviour rather than imposing blanket prohibitions; and
 - (f) Upholding the principle of professional self-regulation.

- 5. The SMC and the Working Committee are grateful for the feedback from the medical profession during the initial stage of providing suggestions on the areas for revision, focus group discussions and consultation exercises. The authority and integrity of any ethical framework for the medical profession has to be based upon the collective wisdom that exists within the medical profession and its associated professional and institutional bodies.
- 6. Copies of the 2016 ECEG and HME have been uploaded on SMC's website for your reading and compliance when it comes into force on <u>1 January 2017</u>. As the 2016 ECEG is more comprehensive than the 2002 ECEG, the interval of time between the publication and effective date of implementation is to allow doctors, institutions and organisations involved in healthcare time to assimilate the 2016 ECEG and if necessary, modify practices in order to comply with it. Please note that the 2002 ECEG will remain in force until 31 December 2016.
- 7. As there have been several new and updated ethical guidelines, SMC will run medical ethics seminars to which all doctors will be invited. You will be receiving an invitation to these seminars and additional details shortly.
