PEER TUTORING

The Peer Tutoring programme was initiated by the students of Secondary 2.8 back in April as a channel for them to contribute meaningfully to the community. The programme involves conducting weekly Math and Science tuition sessions for their juniors in primary 6. The class committee presented their proposal to our Principal, Mdm Mak. Upon receiving her approval, the students also met up with Mrs Eugenie Tan, Principal of St. Anthony's Canossian Primary School (SACPS), to iron out the details of the programme.



The inaugural session kicked off with a purposeful spirit despite the long day for both the seniors and juniors. Through the weekly sessions, the Primary 6 girls were able to grasp complex mathematical concepts better and many had positive feedback. Shalyn Ng (6 Prudence) proclaimed, "The programme has been helpful as I used to be weak in Math before attending this and I have already seen an improvement. My tutor is also dedicated and patient." Another student, Naomi Quentin (6 Prudence) expressed, "I found it easier to understand the concepts as it was presented from a student's point of view."

The Secondary 2.8 students have also benefitted from this experience – through fostering stronger bonds with their juniors and as well as with their peers in the course of working together. They also gained confidence and most of all experienced the fulfilment of helping others as summed up by Crystel Chia (Secondary 2.8):

"It was a great opportunity to help my juniors with their PSLE questions. Having gone through the PSLE myself, I understand the stress level and problems they're facing. I just want to help out whenever and wherever I can, to make a difference."

The programme has demonstrated that through the act of kindness, even the smallest bit of effort to help can make a great difference for the primary school students to improve in their work.

The SACSS Career Festival was held from 25 to 27 August to allow our students to identify their career interests and plan for the aspired educational pathways towards achieving their goals.



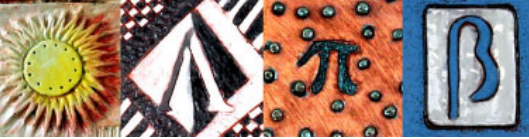

ART-MATH TRAIL

The Life Arts and Mathematics Departments collaborated to create the Art-Math trail. The project began with the creation of ceramic tiles featuring Greek symbols that are also part of the Mathematical lexicon. The creative tile-making process challenges our students to compose their work of art using symbolism, textures, form and colours.



The completed tiles will be installed to form a visually compelling outdoor experiential Math learning trail where students solve puzzles and engage in games relating to Mathematical concepts. The Language Arts Week 2015 was held from 20 to 24 of July. This year, the activities were focussed on celebrating local creative works as part of the SG50 celebrations, hence, the theme His Story, Her Story, Our Story.



The critically acclaimed film *Ilo Ilo*, produced by local writer-director Anthony Chen, was screened as part of the event. Also organised was a book fair featuring titles published by Ethos Books, an independent boutique publisher of literary works by Singapore writers, to expose our students to Singapore Literature.

This year's Literature Symposium was held on 22 July. The symposium featured two distinguished speakers from the National Institute of Education who made time to conduct the insightful sessions for the Secondary 3 Pure Literature and Literature Elective students. Dr Dennis Yeo captivated the students with his sharing on Singapore Literature while Dr Patricia Wong guided the girls in deepening their

understanding of their Literature text, *The Joy Luck Club*.

Like in the previous year, a sharing session conducted by two teachers and five JC2 students from St. Andrew's Junior College was conducted for our Literature students from the graduating classes. The sharing covered understanding and approaching the Unseen component of the Literature paper. To align the sharing with this year's focus, a poem entitled *Postcards from Chinatown* by local poet Terence Heng was selected for analysis.

Other fringe activities held included the Spelling Bee and Language Games, intended for students from Secondary 1 and 2.

THE INAUGURAL SCIENCE WEEK

– Getting SACSS Students Excited About Science

The inaugural Science Week was held from 8 to 15 July. Aligned with the theme of the week-long event, Bringing Relevance to Science, novel and fun activities were organised to allow the students to apply the scientific knowledge learnt during lessons and to better relate this with their daily living as well as to inspire them to pursue Science related studies for their post-secondary education.

During Science Week students from the Secondary 3 Express classes were tasked with working on project-based group assignments relating to Everyday Science. The groups then set up booths to present their Science projects which were then graded by the teachers using a Performance-based rubric. Secondary 1 students who were invited to attend the presentation also contributed to the grading by casting their votes for the most popular projects.

There were also interactive games booths to engage the student population in the competitive games to win prizes.

Speakers from other organisations were invited to conduct career talks for the Secondary 4 and 5 students to raise their awareness of career opportunities available. Ms Tricia Seetoh from the Singapore Chemistry Industry Council

(SCIC) shared with the students on the career paths while NTU's Associate Professor Lim Yeow Khee who is also President of the Singapore Institute of Aerospace Engineer (SIAE) and Managing Director of the LYK Aerospace (S) Pte Ltd shared with the students about the growing aerospace sector.

The Secondary 3 students who are currently working on their Science Research Projects conducted a sharing session on their experience with the lower secondary Science Research Programme (SRP) students.

Jet'aime Perfumery conducted a Perfume Workshop for 20 students who were accompanied by their mothers. The workshop also served as a bonding session for the girls and their mothers as they engaged in the hands-on session to create a unique fragrance. Two Science educators from The Singapore Science Centre awed the lower secondary students with a Mixology Show that featured the art of creating small-scale pyrotechnics and vivid visual effects through chemical reactions.

The encouraging response during the inaugural event has indeed raised the awareness of Science and created a sense of wonder and excitement in the students.

MEDIA RESOURCE LIBRARY – Expanding the Repertoire



The school library serves to provide students access to information and ideas – a fundamental need to being successful in today's information and knowledge-based society. Research has shown that students with access to a well-supported school library programme score higher on reading assessments.

Efforts to meet increasing demand to better support the school's curriculum is ongoing to expand the library with an addition of more than 1000 new titles. The non-fiction titles added include books on famous people in history. Books on a wide variety of categories such as cookery, art, photography, costumes and make up, gardening and plants, drama, hobbies and craft, music and movies have also been acquired to cater to diverse interests. An array of fictional genres – ranging from murder and mystery to fantasy and historical fiction – has also been included. A periodicals section, offering titles from Reader's Digest to the Food & Travel magazine, is also being set up.



Besides the expansion of the library's collection, other improvements include a mobile cart with laptops to support the ICT needs and to provide students with easy access to a computer. Going forward, the library is also evaluating the option of offering e-book lending.

The girls find his familiar presence reassuring and he has come to be a positive role model to our students. They greet me whenever they see me in the library and often consult me about the books they should read."**

Mdm Heng She oversees the operations of the library and mentors the student librarians on the running of the library. She also facilitates book loans and ensures that the books are returned on time to the library. She also assists in managing events held in the library – such as creative writing workshops, literary circles and arranges the sale of tickets for movie afternoons during the annual Language Arts Week.

Language and Cultural Immersion Programme



From 6 to 9 June 2015, a group of twenty-six students accompanied by four teachers went on a Language and Cultural Immersion Programme in Bali, Indonesia. As the programme was a collaborative effort between the Malay Language Department and the NA/NT Department, the composition of students included those of other ethnic groups besides Malay students.

During the 4-day/3-night stay, the students had the opportunity to immerse in the Balinese culture. Besides soaking up the sights and sounds from the colourful streetscape, the group also visited many interesting sights. These included the Green Camp, RumahDesa, Tanah Lot, the Kintamani Volcano as well as a local orphanage as part of the trip's VIA (Values in Action) programme.

At the Green Camp, students learnt to play the traditional drums, went leaves hunting and learnt to make a chocolate sauce. The students also attended a Recycled Art Workshop where they were taught how to create amazing works of art using newspapers and rubber tyres.

At the RumahDesa, the students were exposed to the traditional Balinese House and Community Life and immersed themselves in kampong activities including planting padi in the paddy fields, riding a cow, extracting coconut oil and making kites. They also relished the variety of Balinese cuisine such as the Balinese satay served in the Megibung tradition.

The students were briefed about the cultural etiquette of the Balinese people and were mindful of this as they engaged with the children during their visit at the orphanage. The children enjoyed the meaningful activities and games conducted by the visitors whilst the gifts of toys, books and clothes brought cheer. *"The Bali Language and Cultural Immersion Programme was an enriching one. I learnt the importance of other-centredness so that we do not unwittingly show disrespect. Bali is such a wonderful place to be in... from the rich culture and lifestyle of the Balinese people to the awe-inspiring calmness of the natural scenery. Reading Club Immersion Programme Taipei and Taichung

During the June holidays, twenty-four Secondary 2 and 3 students, accompanied by three teachers, embarked on a 7-day/6-night Reading Club Immersion Programme in Taipei and Taichung. The programme aimed to cultivate a love for reading and allowed our students to immerse themselves in a Chinese Reading Programme conducted by secondary schools in Taiwan as well as to develop global awareness and cross-cultural skills.

The programme included reading sessions conducted by an author, an introduction to illustrated books and a tour of a publishing facility to attain a behind-the-scenes perspective into the book publishing processes. School visits were also organised for our students to Ming Dao Middle School, Hui Wen Middle School and Keelung Shengxin High School where the students were introduced to the reading and writing of poetry and engaged in discussions on societal issues with their peers and widened their perspectives in the process.



During the trip, our students were introduced to a form of artwork using aluminium drink cans. Other cultural activities facilitated included releasing traditional sky lanterns, visits to cultural sites such as National Palace Museum and Chiang Kai Shek Cultural Park. 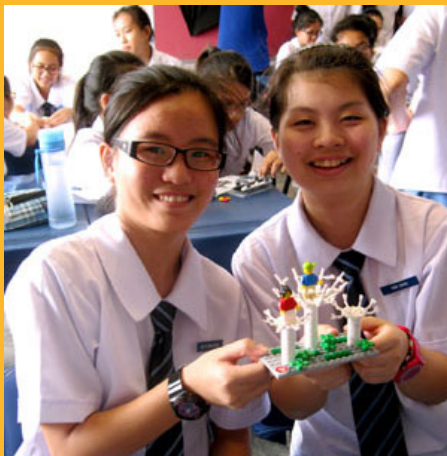

SG50 Building MySG – Reflect, Celebrate, Inspire

To commemorate 50 years of Nation building, the Ministry of Education presented to each staff and student a specially commissioned Lego set that can be used to construct models of three iconic Singapore landmarks, namely the historical Cavenagh Bridge, Singapore Changi Airport's control tower or the spectacular supertrees at Gardens by the Bay.

As part of the project to commemorate 135 years of Canossian presence in Singapore and to celebrate the official opening of the renovated campus, plans were drawn up to upgrade the Heritage Gallery.
