Allied Health Professionals (AHPs) are a diverse group of professionals who provide direct clinical care for diseases or illnesses, and/or services that inform diagnosis, assessment or treatment planning to improve overall health and wellbeing.

AHPs routinely manage complex cases and deliver care across three main domains:

1 Psychosocial
and behavioural care

2 Rehabilitation
and functional care

3 Diagnostics
and therapeutics

To support strategic planning, NAHS will start with these Allied Health Professionals for Phase 1, based on the readiness of existing training pathways and recognised qualification requirements.
